■ Heavitree Quarry Trails

- Heavitree Quarries came out on top of the voting last year so we're really excited about the community-involved and creative potentials of celebrating our quarries and our very own Heavitree Stone.

Here's a little background:-

You'll be familiar with many of Exeter's Mediaeval features, such as St Edmunds Bridge, St Nicholas Priory, many of Quay warehouses and our little distinctive red stone chapels (St Stephens, St Pancras, St Olaves, St Mary Steps) which are all made from stone <u>quarried here in Heavitree</u>. More than this, there are long expanses of boundary walls, like the extraordinary example all along Wonford Road that make great "trails" to follow.

So, we've hit upon the idea this time of extending our celebrations out from the Quarry Lane/Coates Road quarries and all the way into the City to these amazing examples of Mediaeval stone working. What a great way to show the rest of the City just how much they owe to Heavitree!

And the trails could be arranged in any way you think.

Tours led with actors in costume, trails way-marked with local stories and photography, audio-trails perhaps? – and where they converge there could be fun events, exhibitions or happenings.



It's bigger than anything we've done before and just doing the initial survey (the survey is a hallmark of the Squilometre, placebased technique) is going to be a much bigger task than usual so we're going to need all hands on deck.

First stage – we've applied for funding to hold some planning meetings with proper space, resources and refreshments and this is your invitation to attend. - Fore Street improvements

One interesting development this year is the possibility of gaining a commission from Exeter City Council to help with the "improvement" and "enhancement" of Fore Street, Heavitree using the *Squilometre*, community-involved approach. This would be using monies provided under Section 106 by the Waitrose and Rydon Lane Retail Park developments. We've submitted a proposal for this and, if successful, it will move forward this year alongside the Quarry project survey and may mean that the main body of the Quarry Trails work is moved into 2018. But don't worry, we're not going anywhere and neither is the Heavitree Stone! - With your help we'll take the project to it's full potential.

We can also reveal that we are currently seeking advice on the most appropriate form of not-for-profit incorporation for the Heavitree *Squilometre* project as a separate entity from Interwoven Productions. Interwoven, as a collective of professional artists, will stay active in Heavitree and remain available for your commissions but we think that it's time to hand this Heavitree-specific project over to you. It's growing at a remarkable rate and has demonstrated just how powerful a place-based, community-commissioned approach can be in bringing people together and connecting them to their place.
